History of The Hub

This historic, Grade A listed building forms an integral part of the architectural fabric of Edinburgh. Constructed between 1842 and 1845 on a site previously cleared of tenements, it was originally named Victoria Hall and built as the Assembly Hall and offices for the Church of Scotland. The architects were James Gillespie Graham, responsible for the overall form and plan of the building and Augustus Welby Pugin, famous for his work on the Houses of Parliament, who designed the spire, detailing and internal form.

The interior is similar to Pugin's work on the House of Lords and the spire is similar to his designs for the Ideal Pansh Church, illustrated in his book. The True Principles of Christian Architecture. The building was conceived as a simple box with stupendous spire – the box contained the offices of the Church of Scotland on the ground floor and the Assembly Hall above.

Following the 1929 union of the Church of Scotland and the United Free Church, the building ceased to be used as the Assembly Hall. In subsequent years, it was used as a temporary home for various congregations and, in 1956, was named the Highland Tolbooth St John's Church.

The building fell into disuse as a church in the early 1980s and, while the external fabric of the building was in reasonably good order, the inside became virtually derelict. The transformation of the Tolbooth to accommodate the offices of and performance space for The Edinburgh International Festival provided an opportunity to return this historic site to its deservedly central role in Edinburgh's public life.
