As the new editor of The Scotsman I have been residing in Edinburgh for a relatively short time. What strikes me as fascinating is that the city enthrals both newcomers and long-time residents alike.

Its magic remains powerful no matter how long you've been here. Edinburgh continues to seduce as love affairs with many other cities fade away.

For all that it is a rapidly changing city too, and the pace of change is ever increasing. Although the parliament is certainly the most high-profile building to go up in the Scottish Capital in recent years, bringing much new life to the Holyrood and Canongate area, the city has also seen successful growth in other areas that had remained stagnant for years, including the Financial sector at Morrison Street and Lothian Road, the Omni centre at Greenside Place and the new HBOS bank building at Tollcross. Edinburgh is a beautiful city with a unique built heritage to which it owes a great deal of its reputation as a fantastic place to live and work, and therefore a great deal of its success. The city has a unique challenge to boldly develop and innovate, as it has before, while preserving the treasures of the past. Perhaps the future of Princes Street, arguably Scotland's best-known retail thoroughfare, best embodies this challenge.

Recognising the change in the city's fast-moving development, infrastructure is developing too. The city's transport needs are changing and the airport is expanding, there are plans for a rail link to the airport and another for the Borders, and a tram system for the city centre which would also link to the airport. But there are still some major transport issues to be tackled, not least how the vital link across the Forth to Fife is developed.

The world famous Edinburgh Festival remains the highlight of the year but it must continue to innovate to see off upstarts around the world. There is enough passion and creativity in the city to ensure this is achieved.

The challenges that come with an expanding Edinburgh are the best kind of challenges, and I am confident they will continue to be met in the city's customary dynamic and ambitious way. It is not just vital for the city, but vital for Scotland.

Edinburgh an inspired choice for business

Edinburgh is an inspiring capital. For almost one thousand years, our ancient castle, perched on top of its volcanic outcrop, has watched its citizens grow and prosper. In Edinburgh, we are rightly proud of our heritage – but we are not imprisoned by it. We believe that Edinburgh has a great past, a great present and a great future.

Out of a period in the 18th Century known in Scotland as The Enlightenment, represented by a flowering of scientific and cultural ideas, came the wonderful architecture of Edinburgh's New Town and with it a realisation that we could shape our environment and our destiny. Function and form could have a common expression that was both useful and beautiful - the Athens of the North, as the Victorians knew Edinburgh - referred to the physical and intellectual achievements of a resourceful people. Today, we have much to thank them for. Ours is a rich inheritance, characterised by a quality of life and urban environment that has no equal in Britain and is found only rarely elsewhere.

Essentially, Edinburgh is a metropolitan centre of excellence in a provincial city scale. With a population of 450,000 and stretching no more than seven miles across, it lacks the endless urban sprawl of cities like London and permits its citizens to escape (should they wish) in less than 40 minutes, to the coast and countryside.

With assets like these, it's no surprise that the metropolitan region, with Edinburgh at its heart, is the new engine room of the Scottish economy. The city's economy is growing at twice the rate of the rest of Scotland and 50% higher than the rest of the UK. And between them, Edinburgh and Glasgow have half of all new jobs in Scotland between 1995 and 2003.

Sustaining this growth is therefore going to be vital for the Scottish economy. Scotland's First Minister, Jack McConnell, told the Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce AGM in 2006: "This city has to prosper for the whole of Scotland to prosper."

Traditionally, Edinburgh's prosperity is built upon the foundation stone laid down over three hundred years ago with the establishment of the Bank of Scotland and Royal Bank of Scotland. Today, the city is the most important financial centre outside London and Frankfurt, with banks such as Lloyds TSB Scotland, HSBC and the Clydesdale providing strong competition in the banking sector. Moreover, fund managers such as Scottish Widows, Standard Life and Scottish Life all have their HQs here, at the heart of Scotland's financial services sector, which contributes £5 billion to Scotland's GDP and supports more than 110,000 jobs.

A City to visit for business and leisure

Business and leisure tourism has been another success story for Edinburgh built upon the established reputation of its festivals and the outstanding quality of its built and natural heritage. In recent years, Edinburgh has sustained a top 10 position in the world conference league and collected numerous awards as the favourite city for the discerning readers of publications like Conde Nast Traveller, The Observer, The Guardian and Lonely Planet. As a consequence, Edinburgh is a genuine year-round tourism city, its winter festivals illuminating the darker winter months and helping the city's hotels to sustain a year-round occupancy.

The city's attraction to visitors has been made more compelling by the availability of more non-stop flights to its airport, with 14 new UK and European services introduced in the last year alone (2006).

With the most recognisable city centre of any European capital at its

heart, Edinburgh has a unique shopping experience to offer residents and visitors alike. Its retail mix has been enhanced by the arrival in town of Harvey Nichols and investment of more than half a billion pounds in new retail developments and infrastructure like Princes Mall and St James Centre. Together with ambitious new plans for Princes Street, Edinburgh's retail renaissance is truly underway.

A City for the future

That investment is pouring into Edinburgh's transport infrastructure with a £150 million up-grade of Edinburgh's Waverley Station underway and a further £600 million planned in a new tram network which will link the city's waterfront and city centre with the airport by 2012. A further investment of £750 million has been approved by the Scottish Executive for the Edinburgh Airport Rail Link (EARL) which will link Scotland's trunk rail network with the city and its airport, delivering a cost-benefit ratio of £2.16 for every £1 spent. On the Waterfront, major changes are underway, transforming an area of the city previously starved of investment into a £3.5 billion centre of business, retail and leisure activity on a 700-acre site. Waterfront Edinburgh will create over a million square feet of commercial, retail and hotel space, complementing the construction of 5,300 homes and over 250,000 square feet of cultural and leisure space. Further along the shoreline at Leith. Forth Ports is investing in residential, retail and tourism facilities centred upon a proposal for an international cruise liner terminal.

Bold and ambitious developments like these are synonymous with a city with confidence in the resourcefulness of its people. In Edinburgh Park, the city hosts one of the premier business centres in the UK and the Edinburgh Science Triangle is an alliance of some of the brightest and best researchers, academics and scientists in the country. Together, our science parks are scheduled to deliver £750 million additional economic benefit to Scotland each year.



"Bold and ambitious developments like these are synonymous with a city with confidence in the resourcefulness of its people" Meanwhile, a vibrant new district is growing within the city's World Heritage Site. Transforming a 19acre site of the former Edinburgh Royal Infirmary into an exciting new leisure and business community, Quartermile will blend the city's heritage with attractive new buildings in a framework designed by the world-renowned architects, Foster and Partners.

A City of education and technology

The Scots are justly proud of their tradition in supporting the ambition of young people in their schools, colleges and universities and nowhere is this more visible than in Edinburgh, with a student population of 50,000 adding vibrancy to the city and its cultural life. Edinburgh's universities, colleges and management schools hold a worldwide reputation for excellence in medicine, science, engineering, bioscience and IT. Indeed, the pioneering work of the universities has supported breakthroughs that have significantly advanced human knowledge and discovery. Our universities are also creating vibrant young companies which are developing products and services for world markets in technology, bioscience and engineering.

It's in Edinburgh too that the latest technologies in defence radar systems are developed by the UK's Manufacturer of the Year, Selex Airborne Systems. Their AESA system is a breakthrough in radar technology, providing more reliability, visibility and security than previous technologies. It has helped the company win \$30 million of export contracts around the world, securing 2,000 high value-added jobs for Edinburgh.

It's this ambition that is driving Edinburgh forward as an Inspiring Capital, a city of outstanding natural beauty and heritage, where opportunities to live, work and invest in a quality of life unparalleled anywhere in Europe are here to be discovered.

Edinburgh is linked by road, rail, air and sea – a gateway to the rest of Scotland, the city's transport links mean it's an easy place to get to, get around and get on with business

AIR

Edinburgh Airport

Edinburgh Airport is Scotland's capital airport, with a worldwide reputation and worldwide connections. Over 40 airlines serve over 80 destinations, and over eight million business and leisure passengers pass through the airport a year – numbers which are set to grow as the airport develops new international connections to the USA, Germany, Italy, Poland, Spain, Finland and Norway.

The most popular destinations are in Spain, although Paris, Amsterdam, Belfast and Dublin are also long standing favourites. New York is the most popular long-haul destination, and the top domestic destinations include Birmingham, Belfast, Manchester and the London airports.

Edinburgh Airport is situated to the north-west of the city, just off the A8 and is approximately 20 minutes by car from the city centre.

There are three public car parking areas within the airport offering a total of approximately 6,400 spaces. There is also a passenger drop-off area in the forecourt area.

Getting to/from the airport

Nearest rail stations -Edinburgh Waverley, Haymarket and Inverkeithing.

Edinburgh Shuttle is a door to door service between Edinburgh Airport and anywhere within a specified City Centre zone. The fleet of 7-seater mini coaches run daily every 15-30 minutes. For more information visit www.edinburghshuttle.com

Lothian Buses' number 35 service connects the airport to the Gyle, Fountainbridge and Ocean Terminal in Leith. Stagecoach runs the Airdirect 747 service to Ferry Toll Park and Ride and Inverkeithing railway station. The journey time is approximately 25 minutes.

Airlink 100 is a fast and frequent bus service operated by Lothian Buses, and is a quick and cost effective way to reach the centre of Edinburgh. It runs to and from Waverley Bridge and takes around 25 minutes.

The average price of a taxi fare to the city centre is £15 (Jan 2007). Three separate taxi ranks exist in the airport's forecourt area. The fleet of \blacktriangleright

airport taxis operates from the eastern end of the terminal building with the city black cabs rank.

The third rank is located in the short stay multi-storey car park and is available for pre-booked taxis.

At the airport

Edinburgh Airport is served by a single terminal. International arrivals is situated at the west end of the building and domestic arrivals at the east. A £19million terminal extension opened September 2005 and provides additional departure lounge and boarding gate facilities, designed to reduce congestion at peak times and reduce the number of coach journeys for aircraft passengers.

A new £5 million food court opened in 2006 and offers passengers a wide choice of refreshments from Caffe Nero, EAT, Wetherspoons and the West Cornwall Pasty Co. The food court is before security so accessible to travellers and visitors.

Passengers can make use of valet parking at Edinburgh Airport, and Car Care offers a professional car wash service. Helping Hand is a service which can give personalised assistance to business associates or family members to smooth their way through the airport on arrival or departure. Passengers can pre-book a lounge in the departure area and there is also wireless internet access at several points before and after security control.

RAIL

First ScotRail

Rail services from Edinburgh connect to towns and cities across Scotland including Aberdeen, Dundee, Dunfermline, Glasgow, Falkirk, Inverness and many more. (See map)

Edinburgh is under three hours away by rail from Inverness and Aberdeen – the Glasgow express takes less than an hour.

First ScotRail is investing some £40 million over seven years to improve services for passengers across key areas: improving stations, facilities, service, punctuality and reliability through dedicated programmes of investment and maintenance. Passenger journeys have increased by nine per cent across the network since First ScotRail took over the franchise in 2004. A variety of ticket types is available to suit the requirements of all customers from commuters to business and leisure travellers. A Flexipass ticket, for example, offers a minimum 10% saving and is ideal for customers who travel the same route several times a week. The ticket is valid on many routes into Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen and Inverness.

Great North Eastern Railway (GNER) and Virgin Trains link Edinburgh and London in just over four hours. York and Newcastle are also only two hours from Edinburgh.

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ROAD

Park and Ride schemes around the city centre offer travellers some 2,585 parking spaces on four sites at Ferrytoll, Ingliston, Hermiston and Newcraighall. Two more Park and Ride sites are planned for the city at Sheriffhall and Straiton Park.



Edinburgh City is connected well by road with journey times of approximately one hour from Glasgow (M8), two hours 35 minutes from Newcastle (A1) and six hours and 50 minutes from London (M25 and M5).

Park and Ride schemes around the city centre offer travellers some 2,585 parking spaces on four sites at Ferrytoll, Ingliston, Hermiston and Newcraighall. Two more Park and Ride sites are planned for the city.

The city's car parks offer over 4,400 parking spaces and are located all around the city – the largest of which is at Greenside Place, north east of the Castle, offering 1,030 spaces. A car park map can be downloaded from Edinburgh City Council's website. Leith's Ocean Terminal shopping centre has its own free car park with over 1,600 spaces.

For local transport options, there is a good service of buses and plenty of taxi and minicab companies. For more information contact:

Edinburgh is in the wealthiest five per cent of European cities and is also one of Europe's largest fund management bases.** Edinburgh holds many trump cards when it comes to being the home of your business – from infrastructure and business support to international reputation and geographic location – the city has much to offer the business world

The region of Edinburgh and Lothians accounted for some 17.6%* of all new businesses in 2005 – the highest figure across Scotland. Glasgow and Edinburgh together have accounted for half of all new jobs created between 1995 and 2003 as their economies grew at twice the rate of the rest of Scotland – an impressive 50% faster than the UK average.

Edinburgh is the UK's second and Europe's sixth largest financial centre. The economy is dominated by the service sector with financial and business services being most prominent. The city is also one of the largest fund management bases in Europe.** These sectors – as well as tourism, food and drink, life sciences, energy and electronic markets – are thriving in Edinburgh and are key to the future growth of the city, the region, and Scotland as a whole.

And there is so much support for those who want to start or expand their business, whether you need advice on making a business plan, financing your project, or maybe you are thinking of expanding your business and want to employ staff for the first time – the city's Business Gateway can assist and put businesses in contact with helpful partners such as the Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce and a whole range of business support services.

Business Gateway

Business Gateway is a partnership between Scottish Enterprise, the Scottish Executive and Local Authorities that acts as a single point of contact for all publicly-funded services to business.

Business Gateway provides services to existing and start-up businesses in the Edinburgh area led by Scottish Enterprise Edinburgh and Lothian.

By bringing together key resources such as information, advice, learning opportunities, support and help with access to funding, Business Gateway delivers an effective one-stop-shop to help start and grow all types of business.

According to research, more than 80% of the businesses that start with the help of Business Gateway are still successful two years on. One service provided by Business Gateway that users find particularly valuable is the Business Information Service, which provides tailored market research and information to help businesses fully understand and exploit opportunities within their market places.

A wide range of workshops, seminars and other events are also run by Business Gateway to assist people at various stages along their business development journey, whether they need help developing their business ideas, writing a business plan, or need to develop specific skills that will enable them to start or grow their businesses. Edinburgh City Centre

Edinburgh City Centre is a hub for shopping, dining, sightseeing and business and the focus of much investment. Edinburgh City Centre Management (ECCM) is a not-forprofit, public-private partnership set up in 2000 to focus on the promotion, development and improvement of the City Centre.

The Scottish Executive has given ECCM approval and funding to create Edinburgh's first Business Improvement District – a partnership that puts the decision-making power into the hands of businesses to develop and strengthen existing services.

Did you know...?

The Scottish Executive has given Edinburgh City Centre Management (ECCM) approval to create Edinburgh's first Business Improvement District (BID) ECCM has always worked closely with city centre businesses and already has a strong track record of delivering projects and services including the award-winning weekly farmers' market at Castle Terrace; public realm redevelopment on Castle Street; planned public realm projects in St Andrew Square and the Grassmarket; the 2006 International Fashion Festival; and ECCM's successful campaign to reverse the council's traffic management system in the city centre in 2005.

Businesses of every size and type in Edinburgh City Centre face a range of issues that can affect business performance including access around the city centre; safety and security; and the length of time visitors spend in the city centre. There are a number of ways in which these issues can be tackled including, but not exclusively:

- Enhancement of public spaces and the built environment;
- Events and campaigns designed to attract more visitors to the city centre;
- Warden teams dedicated to tackling crime and cleanliness issues in the city centre.

However, to take these ideas forward, businesses must invest collectively in their future.

The Business Improvement District (BID) concept is an ideal model for businesses to use for this purpose as it supports collective investment and genuine partnership – a model that has been proven to work across North America and England. Legislation allowing BIDs in Scotland should be in place by April 2007.

ECCM will be working with businesses again to create a pathfinder BID in the Princes Street/George Street area of the city centre. The success or otherwise of this first BID will influence future decisions to introduce further BIDs throughout the city centre.

ECCM has begun consulting with businesses to develop proposals that would add to existing services provided by the public sector. A business plan will then be put to the business vote, and a BID will be formed. All businesses in the area will then be levied a fee agreed in the business plan – typically one per cent of rateable value. This, and other funding that can be attracted by the BID from other sources, will be used to fund those projects and services contained in the business plan.

The first Edinburgh BID represents an opportunity for city centre businesses to control how their own money is spent in their own area.

Edinburgh Park

In 1995 Edinburgh Park welcomed its first occupier and is now Scotland's largest business park and the fourth largest economic area outside Edinburgh, Aberdeen and Glasgow. It accommodates 7,500 employees in over 110,000sq m of office space spread across 21 organisations.

Edinburgh Park has a unique location of landscaped grounds and green space. Its facilities include The Edge Health and Fitness Club, The Ritz Bar Grill, Cafe2U and construction of a Novotel hotel is underway on the site.

The business park, only 15 minutes from the city centre has its own dedicated railway station and the longest guided busway in the UK – the Fastlink. A car-share scheme is in operation and the park is located next to the M8 motorway and city bypass. The proposed tram link in Edinburgh will link the park to the city centre and the park's development programme spans a further 10 to 15 years.

Edinburgh Park railway station currently sees around 1,500 passenger journeys per day and is served by trains from Bathgate and Dunblane, providing four trains an hour to Haymarket and Waverley and two to Brunstane and Newcraighall.

The station is well served by a crosscity bus service and complementary shuttle buses to the business park. It also benefits from the hourly Stagecoach X40 service that links the station with the Park & Ride facility at Ferrytoll, as well as Sighthill, Riccarton and Corstorphine, and is conveniently located for the Gyle Shopping Centre.

Edinburgh – A City of Science, for business and education

Edinburgh is a hub for scientific research and more and more businesses are locating to the city to share in its wealth of facilities, skilled workers and specialist scientific companies.

Edinburgh has been at the forefront of exciting scientific discoveries for hundreds of years – the University of Edinburgh was founded in 1583 by the Town Council of Edinburgh and, in the years that followed, Edinburgh became the base for Lister's pioneering work in antiseptic surgery and the invention of chloroform anaesthesia by Sir James Young Simpson. Today the city remains a powerhouse of scientific research. The University of Edinburgh alone employs 7,000 staff and has a research income well in excess of £100 million per annum, and the grouping of other university-level research organisations within Edinburgh and the Lothians contribute as much again to the total research activity of the region. World-class expertise within these organisations includes informatics, genomics, medicine, animal health and stem cell research, microelectronics, petroleum discovery and extraction technology and brewing and distilling. The universities, colleges and research organisations involved in this activity have built up over the years state-of-the-art facilities and equipment, and a worldwide network of collaborators and contacts.

Did you know ...?

Edinburgh's science parks are home to some 3,300 researchers, making the city one of the 20 largest science park zones in the world A significant longstanding commitment to commercialisation of this science base has also led to the presence in the region of many exciting technology companies. Within the past five years alone, around 60 start-up and spin-out companies have emerged from the University of Edinburgh. Cutting edge companies based in the region today include: Xilinx, Wolfson Microelectronics, and IndigoVision from the world of electronics, and Charles River, Kendle International, Aptuit, and Ardana from the world of health care.

In 1971 the area became the base for the first science park in Europe, created by Heriot-Watt University. Since that time other science parks and research centres have been created including the Edinburgh Technopole, the University of Edinburgh's science park, which is a joint venture with Grosvenor, the international property group.

In 2004 seven of these science and technology parks came together to create an alliance known as the Edinburgh Science Triangle. Each of the seven parks is housed in quiet landscaped surroundings and yet are close to Edinburgh and the International Airport. You can travel between all the parks in less than an hour, and the Edinburgh Science Triangle alliance has been part of a general movement towards pooling resources and sharing ideas. The parks are now home to some 3,300 researchers, making this collectively one of the 20 largest science park zones in the world. Maintenance of such a strong base requires a highly skilled workforce, and Edinburgh has one of the besttrained workforces in the world. The city has more graduates per head of population than any other city in Europe, and the city's international renown attracts knowledge-based workers from all over the world. The quality of life and high standard of work on offer attract a large pool of general and specialist labour, contributing to a young and vibrant workforce in all the science parks and throughout the city.

The city's three universities ensure a steady stream of talented science and technology graduates, and Scotland as a whole trains a disproportionate number of the UK's life scientists, pharmacists, and medical doctors. With first class infrastructure and accommodation the skilled workforce has easy access to world-leading education and research resources. The Edinburgh Science Triangle provides an exceptional location to do business.

Case Study Edinburgh International Conference Centre

The Edinburgh International Conference Centre (EICC) is owned by the City of Edinburgh Council (CEC). The EICC offers pre event planning, event and exhibition space, security services, a business and media centre and webcast facilities. Since the EICC opened in September 1995 over 2000 events have taken place at the facilities producing over 1.5 million delegate days and a positive economic impact of £200 million. The EICC employs 61 full time staff.

EICC conducted a sustainability review, with support from the Business Environment Partnership (BEP). The review identified a wide range of opportunities for the EICC to improve its social and economic performance through: improved employee relations, increased community participation and improved supplier policy and practice. Key environmental impacts were tackled by: addressing climate change (through site energy use and travel plans), monitoring materials use and waste management. The EICC has already introduced a number of good working practices as part of its aim to be a "centre of excellence and a benchmark for the service industry". This involves the adoption of the EFQM Business Excellence Model that employs the ISO14001 environmental management system and Investors in People employee development system.

Since the review, the EICC has achieved even greater results:

- Green Tourism Business Scheme (GTBS) Gold Award since 2002
- Business Environmental Excellence
 Gold Award
- Achieved 44% reduction in packaging waste and reduction in general waste from 85.36 ton to 48.4 ton per annum.

The EICC has also established the Sustainable Events Programme, which actively manages the impact of each event. The programme benefits from an extremely high level of participation from staff. Staff involvement is encouraged through the Teams of Excellence scheme, which rewards staff for innovative ideas which reduce waste, save energy and improve the environmental performance of EICC. The programme extends the current ISO 14001 accredited environmental management system and addresses a wider range of social, economic and environmental impacts.

Edinburgh | Fairtrade city

Edinburgh is one of only two Fairtrade Capital Cities – but in total there are currently some 205 Fairtrade Towns, Cities, Boroughs and Zones in the UK

The City of Edinburgh and University of Edinburgh both achieved Fairtrade status back in March 2004.

The Fairtrade Towns campaign was established to raise awareness of the FAIRTRADE Mark, the only independent consumer guarantee of a fair deal for producers in developing countries.

Fairtrade status is achieved when local communities meet the five goals set out by the Fairtrade Foundation and make a substantial commitment to the promotion and uptake of Fairtrade goods, both at local authority level and in shops and businesses.

By ensuring that local councils support Fairtrade and that a percentage of local shops and businesses sell Fairtrade, the Fairtrade Towns movement has played a dynamic role in doubling the sales of products carrying the FAIRTRADE Mark in the past two years. Figures for 2005 show sales reached an estimated £195m a year, a 40% increase on the year before.

Bruce Crowther, who started Fairtrade Towns movement in 2000 and is now the national Fairtrade Towns Coordinator for the Fairtrade Foundation says, "The network of Fairtrade Towns has become a wonderful way of involving people in councils, synagogues, churches, mosques, businesses, shops, supermarkets, cafés, bars - in fact throughout the whole community right across the country. The towns raise awareness and sales of Fairtrade both contribute to tackling poverty and improving the lot of marginalised and disadvantaged farmers."

Crowther added: "One of the biggest achievements of the steering groups behind Fairtrade Towns has been to crack the complex world of catering and procurement and getting Fairtrade into local authorities, workplaces, schools and Primary Healthcare Trusts."

According to a poll conducted by MORI in 2005 for the Fairtrade Foundation, some 50% of the adult population can now identify the FAIRTRADE Mark, up from 25% in 2003 and 39% in 2004. That's one in every two adults in the UK – and it's a younger and more diverse audience than ever before with the highest recognition factor among the 25-34 age group.

Harriet Lamb, Director of the Fairtrade Foundation, said: "Reaching 50% of the population is a hugely significant marker for us. Companies should take note that the public are more canny and caring than they are often given credit for. Price is emphatically not their only concern when they go shopping – they do want reassurance that farmers in developing countries receive a better deal."

Five goals to achieve Fairtrade status

Towns, cities, villages, islands, boroughs, counties and zones can achieve Fairtrade status by meeting five goals set by the Fairtrade Foundation. For simplicity all these places are referred to as Fairtrade Towns. The five goals to achieve Fairtrade Town status are:

- 1 The local council passes a resolution supporting Fairtrade and agrees to serve Fairtrade coffee and tea at its meetings and in its offices and canteens;
- 2 A range of Fairtrade products is readily available in the area's shops and catering establishments;
- 3 Fairtrade products are used by a number of local work places and community organisations (churches, schools etc);
- 4 Media coverage and popular support is encouraged for the campaign; and
- 5 A Local Fairtrade Steering Group is convened to ensure commitment to Fairtrade Town status

Case Study History Gets Hi-Tech

Win Brogan of Edinburgh-based firm Mercat Tours isn't afraid of ghosts and ghouls. She'd be in the wrong business if she was – the firm specialises in ghost walks and history tours of the city's old town.

As Head of Development for the company, however, Win was frightened by how its business systems and lack of IT was stifling the company's growth.

Win explained: "We knew our website needed updating if we were to encourage more people to book our tours and we'd need to revamp our paper-based booking system but we didn't know where to begin.

"Napier University's eBusiness Projects within the Project Development Unit of Lifelong Learning was recommended to us through the Chamber of Commerce. The University appointed an e-business adviser who identified the manual transfer of large amounts of data as an issue. We were spending a lot of time servicing our technology rather than the other way round.

"We needed a fully integrated system so that the website, the guides and sales staff on the street, and the office were all talking to each other. Napier was also useful in ensuring that we didn't get more than we needed.

"The adviser helped us prepare a tender document for the work needed and put it out to a range of companies – and they also helped us make our final selection. Now Napier has settled into a monitoring role – keeping a watching brief."

"We are very much in partnership with the business. We find that businesses soon go from asking 'how can we afford this?' to 'how can we afford not to do this?'"

Thanks to the advice of Napier University, the installation of a new website and hi-tech booking system has seen Mercat Tours increase its ticket sales by 125% in the first four months of its operation. In fact, the proportion of online sales has grown by 230% and private bookings are soaring due to a focus on search engine optimisation.

Stephanie Burns, 18, has undertaken a 12-month fulltime placement with ProjectScotland at Health in Mind - an Edinburgh-based organisation set up to promote the health and well being of people who experience mental health difficulties, and she has discovered that this may be the ideal career for her.

"My mum heard about ProjectScotland on the radio and thought it was something I should look into. I visited the website and wanted to be a part of it - it seemed too good a chance to miss.

"I wanted to gain experience in this field of work and find out if it was really the type of job for me, but I also wanted to do something to help other people with the experience I already have." Stephanie's day to day role as a 're:discover volunteer' was focused around developing relationships with five individuals with various mental health problems. She met with each for two-three hours a week, setting goals and promoting recovery so that the individual is more empowered and less able to be isolated by society.

"I also did a fair bit of office work in particular getting a newsletter off the ground for service users and volunteers. I was given the opportunity to use a Learn Direct computer to practise my computer skills as well as enrolled in a distance learning course at the University of Wales, Lampeter, which gave me a certificate of interpersonal skills for volunteers.

"For me, I'm gained so much out of the ProjectScotland placement. I got hands-on experience in the mental health sector, gaining general office experience, receiving essential training – and overall a real confidence boost!"

ProjectScotland

ProjectScotland is the revolutionary organisation connecting 16-25 year olds with full-time voluntary work placements. It was established in response to a demand from young people from all backgrounds to play an active role in their communities, broaden their horizons and enhance their confidence and experience.

ProjectScotland works with over 130 non-profit organisations across Scotland to create structured and rewarding placements for young people. Volunteers sign up to a fulltime volunteering placement (30-plus hours per week) lasting anything from three to 12 months. During their placement, volunteers are supported with appropriate training and mentoring and are offered a subsistence allowance of £55 per week, travel and childcare expenses.

Since its launch in May 2005 ProjectScotland has exceeded targets and placed over 1,000 young Scots in full-time volunteering positions (over a 100 of these in the Edinburgh area).

Over 850,000 hours of voluntary work has been committed by ProjectScotland volunteers in a variety of fields including media and entertainment, the arts, environment, social care and sports – all of which has brought an enormous boost to the capacity of the voluntary sector.

* Statistics quoted are from The City of Edinburgh Council's 'Edinburgh's Major Development Projects 2006' To maintain Edinburgh's position as the strongest city economy in the UK outside London, a whole host of developments are planned to help the city grow and remain the lifeblood of Scotland's economy

The transport system, key to any city's future success, is set to change as trams are planned for the city by 2010 – opening up the city for visitors, residents and businesses alike.

Projects in hand represent investment to the value of £6 billion* and it is hoped that this will in turn bring thousands more jobs to the region.

The unemployment rate in Edinburgh is already low at 2.3% (Jan 2006) and its workforce is one of the most highly skilled in the UK – an impressive 34% hold a degree level or professional qualification. Edinburgh's City Centre itself has six projects in the pipeline to improve and enhance its image. Although development of a UNESCO site requires careful planning, opportunities for improvement still exist with one of the key targets to increase the amount of retail space available at locations such as Princes Street, St James Centre and St Andrew Square.

Since May 2002 tie Limited has delivered Edinburgh Fastlink - a dedicated 1.5km two lane busway and 3.45km of bus priority measures along with the successful Ingliston Park and Ride site which sits on the A8 corridor into Edinburgh.



Transport Developments in Edinburgh

Edinburgh, like any capital city, must have an efficient and sustainable transport infrastructure in place, particularly as the city continues to grow. For this purpose, in May 2002, tie limited was formed by the City of Edinburgh Council to project manage and delivery a number of vital transport initiatives.

Scotland's boasts a vibrant and diverse capital city, attracting thousands of visitors every year. Edinburgh, like any capital city must have an efficient and sustainable transport infrastructure in place for both city residents and tourists. In May 2002 tie limited was formed by the City of Edinburgh Council to project manage and deliver a number of vital transport initiatives. To date tie has successfully delivered a number of exciting and innovative solutions to Edinburgh's increasing congestion.

The Edinburgh Fastlink scheme was introduced as part of a commitment to improving and providing choices of transport to the public as a means of redressing the current imbalance of dependency on private car usage in Edinburgh. Edinburgh Fastlink is a dedicated 1.5km, two-lane guided busway. Vehicles which use the busway are fitted with specially designed guide wheels. Fastlink comprises of 3.45km of associated on-street bus priority measures, delivering an 8km bus corridor stretching from the city centre to Edinburgh Park.

tie also project managed and delivered a strategically important Park and Ride site at Ingliston on the main A8 corridor into Edinburgh. This site accommodates 535 car parking spaces for a bus-based site, with capacity for future expansion to 1,000. Take up on site has been excellent, and plans to extend the site are being considered.

In addition Edinburgh may soon see the introduction of two large and vital transport projects, bringing with them numerous benefits and opportunities for regeneration and social inclusion. tie successfully promoted and gained parliamentary approval for a tram network in Edinburgh, both tram bills were passed by parliament in March 2006 and were awarded Royal Assent shortly afterwards. Trams will offer a whole new transport choice to the people of Edinburgh, one that is proven to appeal to car users where other public transport options have failed. Trams are reliable, fast and can carry many passengers; they are also electrically powered producing almost no on street pollution which helps to reduce the environmental impact.

A large number of cities throughout the world are currently reaping the benefits their tram networks bring, so too are cities in the UK, including Manchester, Nottingham and Croydon, all boasting a successful tram scheme. Edinburgh's tram network will be delivered in phases with Phase 1a running from Edinburgh Airport to Leith, Phase 1b serving the Granton area of the city connecting it through Craigleith and Roseburn to the City Centre. Phase 2 will serve key development and commuter areas to the West of the city and phase 3 will link Granton to Leith, completing the loop.

A tram network encourages investment, improves the city image and assists regeneration. It will give Edinburgh the edge when competing with other cities for jobs and investment. Trams also promote social inclusion and improve the urban environment. The network is planned to be operational in Edinburgh by 2011.

In addition to initiatives set to improve travel within the city, tie has been tasked with the creation of a strategically important airport rail link. The largest national rail project in Scotland, the Edinburgh Airport Rail Link will connect Edinburgh Airport to the Scottish Rail network, allowing direct travel to destinations across Scotland, including Glasgow, Stirling, Perth, Fife, Inverness, Dundee and Aberdeen. Edinburgh Airport is experiencing rapid growth, an increase that is set to reach and exceed beyond 10 million passengers per year by 2015. In addition, congestion on the airport's surrounding roads is heavy at peak times and it is expected a rail link will help to alleviate traffic problems in this area.



Earlier this year tie successfully gained Royal Assent for a tram network in Edinburgh, which they are hoping will be operational in 2011. tie is also working through the parliamentary consideration stage for Edinburgh Airport Rail Link (EARL) which, if successful, will link 62 stations across Scotland with Edinburgh Airport.







BAA Edinburgh Airport

Edinburgh Airport is dedicated to route development, and works closely with the City of Edinburgh Council and Visit Scotland to promote Edinburgh as a destination.

BAA recognised that passengers prefer to fly direct from Scotland and in 2002 BAA Scotland introduced a £60 million Route Development Fund in a bid to increase the number of international flights available from Scotland. In 2006, the fund was increased to £95 million.

A report by the Fraser of Allander Institute showed that under BAA's leadership and management, Edinburgh Airport contributes over £290 million a year to the Scottish economy and supports more than 7,500 jobs across Scotland, including 2,300 directly employed at the airport.

Over the past 10 years more than £220 million has been spent upgrading terminal and airfield facilities at Edinburgh, to cater for the forecast increase in passenger numbers, including the awardwinning £11 million Air Traffic Control Tower and the redevelopment of the forecourt.

With passenger numbers set to double within a decade, BAA Edinburgh has earmarked almost £300 million for investment in new infrastructure over the next 10 years.

The Edinburgh Airport Master Plan, which looks forward to how the airport might develop between now and 2030, was formally launched in July 2006 by managing director Richard Jeffrey.

More than 40 airlines fly to over 80 destinations from Edinburgh Airport The 25-year blueprint includes:

- Thousands of new jobs for local people
- Improved benefits for Scotland's economy and tourism industry
- 26 million passengers a year by 2030
- More international visitors travelling direct than ever before
- Multi-million pound BAA investment programme
- All developments underpinned by environmental strategies, including key commitments on increased public transport.

Little France Medical & Life Sciences Campus (part of the South East Edinburgh development)

This development is part of the Edinburgh Science Triangle and will create a world-class Centre for Biomedical Research in 100 acres of commercial space. The location of this development is particularly important as the site is adjacent to the new Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh, the University of Edinburgh's medical school and the Queens Medical Research Institute. The goal of the development is to create linkages between academic, clinical and commercial elements at Little France and develop further opportunities for translational medicine in Edinburgh.

Work began in June 2005 with a completion date of 2020. The new site will also be the new home for The Roslin Cells Centre (RCC), a partnership between the Roslin Institute, Scottish Enterprise Edinburgh and Lothian, the University of Edinburgh and Scottish National Blood Transfusion Service (SNBTS). The centre will create clinically useable human stem cell lines compliant with UK and European regulatory requirements. The RCC is currently located at the Roslin Institute. At its new location, it will be next to the University of Edinburgh's Centre for Regenerative Medicine to create a hub for scientists, researchers and international companies working in this field of expertise.

Edinburgh Quay

Edinburgh Quay is a £80m regeneration mixed-use project developed by Edinburgh Quay Ltd, a joint venture between leading UK developer, Miller Developments and British Waterways Scotland. Edinburgh Quay is located at the Lochrin Basin in Fountainbridge and completes the Edinburgh end of The Millennium Link - the £84.5m restoration of the Forth & Clyde and Union canals*. The project represents two firsts for Scotland: the first public-private development venture for British Waterways and the first canal side mixed-use development.

Phase 1 of Edinburgh Quay consists of Grade A office accommodation (7,585sq m) restaurant accommodation (3,344sq m), and 20 luxury apartments, with a further 42 on the south of the canal. Quay 2 (Grade-A office building and second phase of the scheme) comprises circa 57,000 sq ft of offices and 4,300 sq ft of retail accommodation and was completed in December 2006. Once fully occupied Edinburgh Quay will create up to 650 jobs. It will also open up and completely transform the Lochrin Basin for public use formerly home to run-down workshops and an empty office building. The Canal itself was also suffering from a lack of interest due to the fact that many people in Edinburgh were unaware that the Canal came so far into the city. The Canal was underused and in great need of draining and cleaning - a project that has now been undertaken delivering great benefits to canal users and local wildlife. www.quay2.co.uk

* The £84.5m Millennium Link project re-opened Scotland's Lowland canals – the 56km Forth & Clyde Canal and 50km Union Canal – and linked them through The Falkirk Wheel.

No. 1 Quartermile Square, a sevenstorey office building, will comprise over 300,000 sq. ft of Grade A office space. Tourism agency Visit Scotland is looking to grow tourism by 50% by 2015. Edinburgh is blessed with a wealth of history that inspires visitors to return time and again to its attractions. The castle dominates the skyline – perched on the edge of an extinct volcano it has become an icon for the city and the country of Scotland.

Edinburgh is a city of contrasts. The Old Town lines the Royal Mile leading to the new Scottish Parliament buildings at Holyrood. The Georgian New Town offers parks and terraces to explore while the city's shopping streets which span both the Old and New towns and include boutique shops and big name fashion stores. The city's neoclassical architecture led to it being called 'the Athens of the North.'

The city is edged with splendid countryside and is not far from beautiful beaches, golf links, stately homes and cosy pubs. Edinburgh's waterfront, Leith, offers shops of all sizes, restaurants, funky bars and the Ocean Terminal Shopping Centre.

Edinburgh Castle

Castle Hill, Old Town, Edinburgh 0131 225 9846

No visit to Scotland's capital is complete without a visit to its historic and imposing Castle. It's the best place from which to see the city as its views pans 360° across the capital and is also the home of the Scottish Crown Jewels ('The Honours of Scotland'), Edinburgh's oldest building dating from the 1100s - St Margaret's Chapel - the Scottish War Memorial and War Museums. There are two cafés - the Oueen Anne café at the top of Edinburgh Castle in Crown Square offering a waiter service and traditional Scottish Fare and the Redcoat Café offers a familyorientated self-service option located next to the One O'Clock Gun. www.historic-scotland.gov.uk

The Palace at Holyroodhouse

Foot of Royal Mile, Edinburgh EH8 8DX

Situated at the end of the Royal Mile, the Palace at Holyroodhouse is the Queen's official residence in Scotland. Today, the Palace is the setting for State ceremonies and official entertaining – but it has long since been home to successive kings and queens throughout Scotland's turbulent past, including Mary, Queen of Scots. The Palace is also home to The Queen's Gallery which houses many collections of royal art. The magnificent grounds include the ruins of the 12th-century Holyrood Abbey.

Holyrood Park

East of Holyrood Palace and Abbey, Central Edinburgh 0131 652 8150

Edinburgh owes its distinctive skyline to the geographic foundations of historic Holyrood Park. It's a great place for walks and for looking out over the city from its many vantage points. The park offers a wealth of history dating back 1,000s of years including Arthur's Seat – one of four hill forts in the park. Look out for the prehistoric farmstead east of Dunsapie Crag and the medieval rig and furrow cultivations in several locations around the park. www.historic-scotland.gov.uk

The Hub

All year round the heart of the festival beats on at The Hub - the home of the Edinburgh International Festival. Situated at the top of the Royal Mile and just a moment away from Edinburgh Castle, The Hub is a magnificent Gothic building and the best place in town to find out about and experience a little of that festival flavour whatever the time of year. Home to the Bank of Scotland 'Connecting to Music' project and venue for the weekly rehearsals of the Edinburgh Festival Chorus, The Hub is owned by the Edinburgh International Festival Society. The tip of its spire is the highest point in central Edinburgh and can be seen for miles around. It has its own restaurant, Café Hub, and is also a venue for concerts, ceilidhs, banquets and parties as well as educational and community events.

Linlithgow Palace

Linlithgow (off the M9) 01506 842896

Linlithgow Palace, located to the west of the city centre off the M9, was very popular with the monarchs of Scotland and was the birthplace of Mary, Queen of Scots. It was, however, never restored after a fire in 1746. The King's Fountain was, however, restored to working order in 2005. www.historic-scotland.gov.uk

Created by the Victorians, the Camera Obscura has been amazing visitors for 150 years with its moving panorama of the city while the rooftop terrace offers spectacular 360° views of the city. Edinburgh Literary Pub Tour

The tour begins at the historic Beehive Inn in the Grassmarket, and follows a route past the Martyrs' Cross, the site of the old gallows, through the winding streets, wynds and courtyards of the Old Town of Edinburgh, over the Mound and down to Rose Street in the New Town. Led by professional actors this is an entertaining, witty and dramatic romp through the life and work of Scotland's great poets and novelists from the early 18th century to the present day.

The National Trust for Scotland, 7 Charlotte Square, Edinburgh EH2 4DR 0131 226 3318

A beautifully-restored Robert Adam town house containing china and silver collections, fine furniture and portraits. Dating from 1796, the square is part of Edinburgh's World Heritage site and the head offices of the National Trust for Scotland are located at Nos 26-31 Charlotte Square. No. 28 is also owned by NT Scotland and is a newly-expanded and refurbished coffee shop and restaurant with a Scottish bookshop and gallery upstairs. www.nts.org.uk

Lauriston Castle Cramond Road South, Davidson's Mains, Edinburgh EH4 5GD 0131 336 2060

Originally a 1590s tower house, the castle was built for Sir Archibald Napier, and extended during the 1820s by the architect William Burn for its then owner, Thomas Allan. The tranquility of its setting, overlooking the Firth of Forth, combined with its proximity to the centre of Edinburgh, makes Lauriston typical of the large suburban villas which once provided rural amenity for the powerful and wealthy of the city. www.cac.org.uk

Gladstone's Land 477B Lawnmarket, Edinburgh EH1 2NT 0131 226 5856

Completed in 1620, Gladstone's Land is a typical example of an Edinburgh Old Town tenement. Take time to view the fine pictures, period furniture, and beautiful painted ceilings. A 'new' adventure at Gladstone's land is the second-hand book shop. Donations are needed and all proceeds from the book sales go towards conservation projects at Gladstone's Land. The Scottish Parliament

Architect Enric Miralles created Holyrood and he developed a design that was said to be "sitting in the land." A walk around the outside of the building will reveal many of the building's famous stylistic design features including the Debating Chamber, the MSP building and Tower Buildings. The Canongate Wall has stones from around Scotland set in the wall – some are fossils and some have quotations set in them. Scottish flowers have been included in the landscaping and artwork can be seen throughout the Holyrood Building.

Scotland voted in favour of its own Scottish Parliament with tax varying powers on September 11, 1997 by referendum. A devolved government has the power to make decisions on issues such as health, education, police and fire services, and prisons. 'Reserved matters', those dealt with by the UK Parliament, include areas such as foreign affairs, defence and national security. The Scottish Executive is separate to the Scottish Parliament and its members are chosen from the party (or parties) that hold a majority of seats in the Parliament. The First Minister is the counterpart to the UK's Prime Minister. The Scottish Parliament is made up of 129 MSPs (Members of the Scottish Parliament) who are voted for by the public with two votes: the first chooses between candidates in a constituency; the second chooses a political party within a larger electoral area (Scottish Parliament Region).

Itineraries

In a lunchtime... book yourself in for an exquisite lunch on top of the museum of Scotland at The Tower – a restaurant that offers stunning views of the Castle from its roof terrace – and then you are perfectly placed for a quick look round the museum, then you are perfectly placed for a function of the streets outside. AA Gill or a quick snoop round the shops in the streets outside. AA Gill of The Sunday Times called this 'the hottest table in Edinburgh?

In an afternoon... just outside the city is Edinburgh's waterfront at Leith. An afternoon here could include a little shopping around the smaller boutique-style shops – or even a trip round the larger mall – Ocean Terminal. There are a number of restaurants and bars in this area. Visitors shouldn't miss the chance to visit the Royal Yacht Britannia. Regular buses run from the town centre to Leith.

> For a day...get familiar with the city by hopping on the city bus tour. After getting your bearings, head for Edinburgh Castle to experience the capital's most iconic building and soak up the history and grandeur of its walls. Time for a cup of tea in the Redcoat Cafe before heading out down the Royal Mile and turn left toward Princes Street and then further north into the northern Part of the city and the Georgian New Town.

Alternatively, from the Castle down Castlehill, Lawnmarket and The Royal Mile, there are Plenty of sights in close proximity. Edinburgh's Festival centre on the right, The Hub; Gladstone's Land; The Camera Obscura; The Writers' Museum; John Knox House; The People's Museum – all the way down to the Palace at Holyroodhouse – there are Plenty of attractions to while away the afternoon, and many more you'll need to come back for too. If you are feeling energetic, you could head into Holyrood Park and try climbing up to Arthur's Seat for fantastic views over the city. The famous Scottish Parliament Building – Holyrood – is also at this end of The Royal Mile.

Theatre

The Edinburgh Festival and King's Theatres are on Nicholson Street and Leven Street respectively. The Edinburgh Festival Theatre, with a capacity of 1,915 is at the centre of the citv's festival season and is also the capital's arena for Scottish Opera and Scottish Ballet. The King's Theatre, originally built in 1905, offers productions from the Royal National Theatre, major touring drama productions along with Edinburgh's annual pantomime. It is also home to local amateur dramatics societies' productions. www.eft.co.uk

Edinburgh Playhouse,

Greenside Place, is where the big West End shows perform when touring in Edinburgh. Concerts, musicals and shows have included Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, Madam Butterfly and Swan Lake on Ice. During the Festival season, the Playhouse is home to three weeks of dance and opera. www.livenation.co.uk

The Royal Lyceum Theatre on Grindlay Street, Edinburgh, is home to one of Scotland's largest and most successful producing theatre companies: The Royal Lyceum Theatre Company. The company's main season runs from September to May and previous productions have included Mary Stuart, Pinocchio and The Merchant of Venice. www.lyceum.org.uk

The Traverse Theatre -Scotland's new writing theatre on Cambridge Street - is an important place during Festival Fringe, playing host to new writers from Scotland and abroad.

Young people can take the opportunity to work with theatre professionals at the theatre's 'Class Act' project. The Traverse Young Writers group, led by professional playwrights, meets every week. www.traverse.co.uk

The Usher Hall, home to the Royal National Scottish Orchestra, is a landmark in the city centre on Lothian Road and has been the main venue for the Edinburgh International Festival since 1949. Performances include classical, contemporary, family concerts and a rousing proms performance in June. Due to be refurbished in 2007 after the Edinburgh Festival, the Usher Hall will re-open in time for the Festival in 2008. www.usherhall.co.uk

The advertising equivalent value of the press and broadcast coverage generated by the summer festivals alone is estimated to have been £12.6 million in the UK**. The population of Edinburgh in August leaps from an average 450,000 to an amazing one million. Festival time in Edinburgh is an exciting time to be around whether you are participating, visiting or even doing business.

The Edinburgh International Festival is legendary around the world and 2006 marked its 60th anniversary. Performances each year include dance, opera, theatre and music in the city's major theatres and conference halls, along with some smaller venues, while Edinburgh's Fringe Festival provides a showcase for up-and-coming talent.

> The Edinburgh International Festival sits at the centre of the phenomenon that is the Edinburgh Festival, actually many different festivals offering an unparalleled wealth of cultural experiences.

> > Edinburgh's festivals generated some 1.4 million trips to the city from August 2004 to

July 2005 – and this in turn contributed some £40 million of new income in Edinburgh and £51 million in Scotland*.

The festival's impact stretches beyond the city limits of Edinburgh with thousands of visitors also choosing to take the opportunity to visit Glasgow, the Highlands and Islands and the Central Region.

The international profile of the event is one of its strengths as it raises the profile of Edinburgh as a recognisable asset across the world. The advertising equivalent value of the press and broadcast coverage generated by the summer festivals alone is estimated to have been £12.6 million in the UK**.

But the August festivals are just the beginning – throughout the year Edinburgh offers a packed programme of events from the Spring Festival right through to Hogmanay – with so much in between including the Asian Mela.

The city's compact size also means shoppers can cover a wide variety of shopping experiences all in walking distance of each other, seven days a week. And just outside the city centre lie several out-of-town shopping centres all within easy reach by public transport or car.

City Centre

Princes Street is probably the most famous shopping street in Edinburgh and home to the equally renowned department store, Jenners, opposite the Scott Monument.
