## Retirement suits some people well, but others find it harder to turn their back on the world of work.

PRIME's own primary task has become reaching the hard-to-reach Whether the reason is the need to keep earning money, or simply the need to keep active, a growing number of people are setting out on a new business career in their 50s, 60s or even 70s.

So what sort of help is available for people considering the route to building a late-career business? PRIME, a charity founded by Prince Charles, is the only national organisation dedicated to helping people aged 50 or over to start their own businesses or enterprises.

PRIME's own primary task has become reaching the hard-to-reach – those individuals who are not likely to find their own way to the existing business support structure under their own steam, but for whom self-employment might still be a good solution. And there are many of them. In the UK, self-employment is a rather neglected option and many people do not realise that they might be in a position to start their own business and thereby create their own livelihood.
